We sincerely thank the Birdwatchers' Society for their continued support and for providing helpful materials. Their contribution made the session more engaging and meaningful for the students.






Annual Bird Survey 2025 Conducted in Asansol

Winter Waterbird Survey at Harisinghpur, Ghatal, Paschim Medinipur under Kharagpur Forest Division, WBFD

Date: 15.01.2025

Survey Team: Two members from WINGS (Dr. Arkajyoti Mukherjee, Mr. Diptesh Goswami) and four members from WBFD.

Survey Method: Total Count (The **total count method** for waterbird surveys involves systematically counting all individual birds of each species present in a defined area, such as a wetland or waterbody, during a specific time. We used binoculars, cameras, and field guides to identify and record species accurately. The survey was conducted in the early morning when bird activity was highest and visibility was optimal.)

Waterbird Checklist: A total of twelve species belonged to seven families recorded during the survey. Only one winter migrant (Garganey) was recorded during the study.

Major Threats: Water hyacinth blooms and kite flying pose significant threats to waterbirds. Dense water hyacinth infestations degrade aquatic habitats by reducing open water surfaces, depleting oxygen levels, and obstructing access to feeding grounds, leading to habitat unsuitability for many waterbird species. Kite flying, particularly with strings coated in abrasive materials like glass (manjha), endangers birds by causing injuries or fatalities when they collide with or become entangled in the strings. These activities disrupt waterbird populations by impacting their foraging, nesting, and roosting behaviors, underscoring the need for habitat management and community awareness to mitigate these threats.
